

### MÉMOIRE DE L'HONNEUR



I have decided to embark upon a major project for the Grand Chancery of the Legion of Honor: the preservation and capitalization of our archives, both historical and contemporary. They represent the intangible heritage of our institution.

This project, named 'Mémoire de l'honneur' (Memory of Honor), aims to bring to life and make accessible to all the archives which include the biographies of the people decorated with national distinctions, the history of these awards as well as those of the buildings that house their headquarters and the maisons d'éducation of the Legion of Honor.

Given our dedication to our public service mission and our awareness of the attachment of the French people to the Legion of Honor and its influence throughout the world, we ascribe great strategic importance to the Memory of Honor project. All the technical and scientific departments of the Grand Chancery are involved in this initiative, first and foremost an archivist, Chief Heritage Curator, who has been specifically recruited for the purpose.

# AN INSTITUTION AT THE SERVICE OF MERIT AND EXCELLENCE

The Grand Chancery is a French State institution placed under the authority of the President of the Republic, Grand Master of the Legion of Honor. It has three public service missions, governed by the code of the Legion of Honor.

Its primary task is to administer the four highest French Honors: the Legion of Honor, the Military Medal, the National Order of Merit and the National Medal of Recognition for victims of terrorism. Its role is central in the designation of honorees and to ensure the consistency of the French honorary award system.

The Grand Chancery is also endowed with an educational mission. It manages two public sector schools, the maisons d'éducation of the Legion of Honor, founded in 1805; which accommodate a thousand boarding pupils, ranging from the first grade in secondary school to post-baccalaureate classes. Open to the female descendants of French and foreign honorees, these schools have a vocation of excellence and cultivate the values of the national orders.

Finally, the Grand Chancery welcomes a wide range of visitors to the Museum of the Legion of Honor and the Orders of Chivalry. This distinctive Museum, which opened in 1925, is a worldwide reference in its field and contributes to spreading knowledge of French and foreign decorations. It aims to highlight their founding values and the achievements of the people who have received them over the years.

## ARCHIVES OF HIGH HISTORICAL, SOCIOLOGICAL AND SYMBOLIC VALUE

THE GRAND CHANCERY IS 'THE ADMINISTRATION OF HONOR AND MERIT' AND THE DECORATIONS ARE INTENDED TO DISTINGUISH THOSE WHO EXCEL IN THE NAME OF COMMON GOOD, WHILE PUTTING THEM FORWARD AS AN EXAMPLE. THE CAPITALIZATION OF ITS ARCHIVES IS THEREFORE AN INTEGRAL PART OF THE INSTITUTION'S MISSION.

### Honorees and Honors

The greater part of the collections concern the files on its honorees. They cover a period spanning more than 200 years, from the creation of the Legion of Honor in 1802 to the present day. The merits of approximately 900,000 members of the Legion of Honor, one million holders of the Military Medal and 330,000 members of the National Order of Merit are recorded. These files are of first-rate scientific value for historians and sociologists. And, given the French population's enthusiasm for genealogy, they provide valuable biographical and filiation information.

In addition, there are valuable documents on the creation and evolution of each of the distinctions administered by the Grand Chancery: organizational laws and decrees, minutes of the investitures of the Presidents of the Republic as Grand Master, individual papers of the Grand Chancellors, minutes of meetings of the Councils of Orders, and disciplinary files of honorees.

### Maisons d'éducation

The maisons d'éducation of the Legion of Honor have also been generating archives of great historical interest for two centuries. The institution holds many elements that help retrace the creation of these boarding schools by Napoleon, the regulations established over the years for the admission of pupils and their education, documents bearing witness to everyday life, and the personal files of girls and staff.

### Museum

The Museum of the Legion of Honor has a collection of historical archives on French decorations, from the Ancien Regime to the present day, together with documents about its origins, the subscription that brought about its creation, and the donations and bequests that have enriched its collections.

### Buildings

Finally, the Grand Chancery holds the archives concerning the prestigious buildings owned by the Legion of Honor since the First Empire: Hôtel de Salm, Château d'Ecouen, the former Royal Abbey of Saint-Denis and the former Convent of Les Loges in Saint-Germain-en-Laye. On many occasions, these buildings have been renovated and restored, the most substantial being the reconstruction of the Palace of the Legion of Honor after the fire in 1871.

### Biographies of Legion of Honor members - 19th, 20th and 21st centuries

The identity and achievements of the 900,000 members of the Legion of Honor since the creation of the order are known thanks to various documents whose historical and sociological wealth has not yet been fully exploited. First and foremost, there are "mémoires", detailed biographies of the people nominated for the Legion of Honor. But there are also obituaries (photo), which are expansive accounts of individual fates, and more concise documents such as cardboard name cards, award decrees from the First Empire, or "special tables", lists of awards of the decorations in use during the two World Wars.




### Authorizations to wear foreign decorations - 19th and 20th centuries

On the day of his investiture to the supreme office, the President of the Republic is designated Grand Master of the Legion of Honor by the Grand Chancellor. The Grand Chancery keeps most of the minutes of the Grand Masters of the Fifth Republic.

Alphonse-Amédée Lejeune, the institution's architect, was asked to redevelop the maison d'éducation des Loges in Saint-Germain-en-Laye and submitted several projects to the Grand Chancellor. The proposed plans testify to the organization of an educational institution in the mid-19th century.



Letter from Napoleon to Lacépède - 1807

The first Grand Chancellor, the Count of Lacépède, set up the maisons d'éducation of the Legion of Honor wished for by Napoleon. The Emperor issued him with instructions in a letter dated October 22, 1807, which is revelatory of the role he assigned to women in society.

## CONTRASTING CONDITIONS

## AND ACCESSIBILITY

The long-standing activity of the Grand Chancery, its occasionally turbulent history and the geographical dispersal of its buildings explain why its archives are not currently centralized and do not have a standardized inventory. Precise knowledge of the collections and their physical condition is thus incomplete.

The oldest files of the members of the Legion of Honor have been transferred to the National Archives, which has digitized them and put them online. More recent files, together with all other archives, are kept in three locations: at the institution's headquarters and in the two maisons d'éducation, in Saint-Germain-en-Laye and Saint-Denis.

Some archives are stored in purpose-built facilities: such is the case for the "live" files of honorees and for part of the historical archives of the Legion of Honor. On the other hand, others are housed in cellars affected by dampness or exposed to the risk of fire or flooding in the event of the River Seine breaking its banks.

Consequently, the physical condition of the archives is disparate: some documents are perfectly preserved while others display worrying signs of wear and tear or mold.

Public access is very restricted and also varies according to the documents and where they are stored.

## THE 'MÉMOIRE DE L'HONNEUR' **PROJECT**

'MÉMOIRE DE L'HONNEUR' IS A COMPREHENSIVE PROGRAM TO CAPITALIZE UPON THE ARCHIVES OF THE GRAND CHANCERY, FROM THE MOMENT THEY ARE INVENTORIED UNTIL THEY ARE MADE AVAILABLE TO THE PUBLIC.

It comprises four main phases:

- I. MAPPING, which should lead to the compilation of a comprehensive inventory and a standardized classification of more than 3.5 km of archives.
- 2. SAFEGUARDING, which includes both the restoration of damaged archival items and the digitization of as many documents as possible, both of which are necessary for their preservation and communication.
- 3. STORAGE, which will be centralized in a single location (excluding live archives), located in a listed building of the maison d'éducation de Saint-Denis. This building must undergo

major renovation including structural repairs and air treatment that is designed to guarantee optimal conditions of conservation and security.

4. COMMUNICATION WITH THE PUBLIC, which will be done in a dematerialized manner through the development of an IT application consisting of a single file of honorees and historical records. A consultation room is also planned in the dedicated building, to allow access to physical documents.

### PROJECT COST

Renovation of the archive building: 4.7 M€ Restoration - Digitization - IT application development: 3 M€.

#### SCHEDULE

The overall progress of the project closely depends upon the funding it receives. Building renovation: 2021 - 2024 Restoration - Digitization - IT application development: 2020-2023


